About Our Church

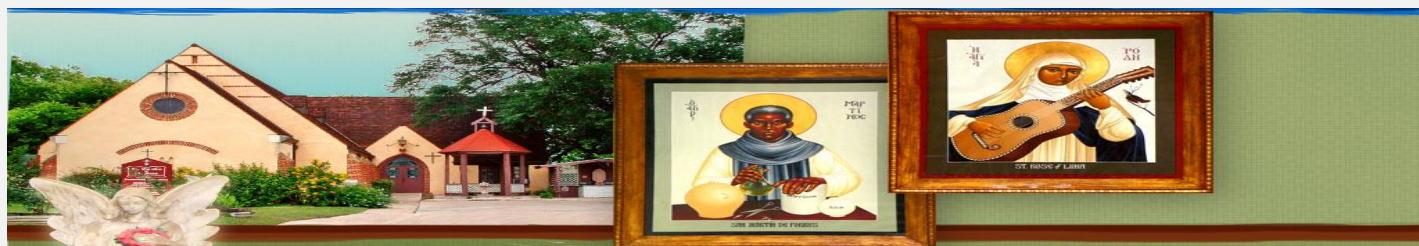

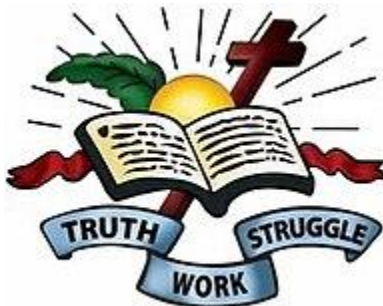


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Instructions:

1. **Open the iBreviary app:** Launch the iBreviary app on your mobile device.
2. **Navigate to the "Download" section:** Find the "Download" option within the app's menu.
3. **Select the date:** Choose the date you want to download the texts.
4. **Choose your language:** Select the language you want the text displayed.
5. **Initiate download:** Click the "Download" button to download the liturgical texts for the selected day.

Reflection

The Gospel today tells of the miracle of water being converted into wine at the wedding at Cana. Jesus and his disciples were there as honored guests. Our Blessed Mother went to Jesus to inform him that there was no more wine. Jesus responded that “his hour had not yet come,” but that his mother proceeded to tell the servants to listen to her son. Was this an act of defiance against God? I do not believe so. I believe it was an act of intercession. Mary, the mother of God, listens to our prayers and intercedes to her son on our behalf. Was this necessary? Could not the bride and bridegroom go and ask Jesus themselves? Could the disciples not have asked their teacher to do something if they noticed it beforehand? I believe that the matter called for a mother’s help. A mother who knew the capabilities of what her son could do, and as the couple beseeched the blessed mother to ask her son for help, it was Mary’s faith in her son that permitted Jesus to follow through with the miracle. Some questions to reflect on this week from this gospel passage can be as follows:

- Do I have faith to go to Jesus as the Blessed Mother did?
- Do I trust that the Blessed Mother will intercede for me, as she did for the couple at the wedding at Cana?
 - Especially during the prayer of the “Hail Mary”, which states: Holy Mary, Mother of God, Pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death.”
- Am I astounded at the miracles Jesus continues to do presently in my life, as people were astounded to witness the miracle of the water being turned into wine at the wedding at Cana?

The message of this Gospel is filled with much grace—the grace of love, family, celebration, and joy that accompany the occasion of a wedding. Let us be filled with that same joy as we await the bridegroom, our Lord Jesus Christ, where wine will overflow and never run out, where the celebration is eternal and will never stop, and the question of miracles occurring will not be questioned, but expected and celebrated for all eternity.

About The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC)

- The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) adopted a “Joint Declaration on Unity” with the Roman Catholic Church through which both bodies agreed to a limited communion arrangement.
 - We are in Dialogue with the Roman Catholic Church
 - The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) permits **divorced people** to participate fully in the Mass and to receive the Eucharist. The church does not recognize civil divorce and requires an annulment before parishioners can remarry.
 - The Polish National Catholic Church(PNCC) is governed by its Constitution and Laws. The legislative authority of the Church is vested in the General Synod, the Special Synod, the Diocesan Synod, and the Parish Meeting. In financial and administrative matters, the Parishioners possess administrative authority. Representatives elected at the Annual Parish Meeting and confirmed by the Diocesan Bishop exercise their constitutional authority.
 - The hierarchy is as follows:
 - Prime Bishop: Rt. Rev. Anthony Mikovsky
 - Diocesan Bishop of the Buffalo-Pittsburgh Diocese: Rt. Rev. John E. Mack

 - The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) is not under the authority of the Pope (Bishop) of Rome.
 - The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) observes the seven sacraments, and they are as follows:
 - 1. Baptism and Confirmation
 - 2. The Word of God
 - 3. Penance
 - 4. Eucharist
 - 5. Holy Unction (Anointing for Health)
 - 6. Holy Orders
 - 7. Matrimony
 - All Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) sacraments are valid and licit.
 - The Polish National Catholic Church (PNCC) clergy are permitted to marry.
